Details and Information about Re-Opening

Church office-open starting April 5th.

- Mondays-Thursdays 8:30-1:30.
- Masks required to enter the building.
- Hand sanitizer at main entrances.
- If you touch something, use bleach wipes to wipe it down (light switches, doors, bathrooms, etc)

Small Groups

- 10 or fewer people can begin to meet in person
- Masked and distanced
- Reservations are required and can be made in the church office

Bathrooms

- All main floor bathrooms are open.
- After use, use bleach wipes on any surfaces you've touched.



Worship Information Many changes and safety precautions are in place.

Online Worship will continue Sundays at 10:00 a.m.

If you are high risk, please continue to worship from home.

Starting April 4th, worship weekly at 9:00 a.m. outdoors.

- Depending on weather Drive-In Worship or Worship in the Lawn
- Lawn services will also be on 88.3 FM, so you can park on Algoma Blvd if you'd like to stay in your car to worship.

Starting April 4th, weekly Children's Sunday School with Lisa-Marie

after Children's Time at the 9:00 service (about 9:10) in the Harmony Room.

Starting May 2nd, weekly Traditional Worship in the Sanctuary at 10:30

In addition to 9:00 Outdoor Worship and 10:00 Online Worship, we'll have masked, distanced, as safe as possible worship with additional distanced seating in **Paine Hall.**

Worship in the Sanctuary will be significantly different...

For now, no singing by the congregation, no passing offering plates, no passing the peace, no verbally sharing prayer requests, no coffee hour.

Windows and doors will be open for airflow and fans will be running (you might want a jacket or a blanket).

However, we will have singing by a performer, prayer request cards to share joys and concerns, collection baskets by the doors, prepackaged communion, and fellowship opportunities outside after the service.

If COVID numbers rise we may need to scale back and/or shut down the service in the sanctuary.

Our goal is to come together as soon as we can, but as safely as possible. As we move through the process of re-opening, we will continually adjust.

Pray with us through this exciting transition.



Dear Church Friends and Family,

Leadership and staff has been focused on doing the work of prayer, research, and planning as we work to re-open as safely as we can.

When my kids were at home and we were getting ready to go on vacation, jobs got divided up so that everyone helped. Someone had to water the plants, someone else cleaned out the litter box, garbage, laundry, and dishes... Each person had their own responsibilities so that we could get it done and be ready to go.

- 5 Family seating tables set up in Paine
- Kitchen cleaned including vent fan
- Harmony room cleaned
- Paine Hall cleaned including blinds, window sills
- Sanctuary cleaned including dusting and window sills
- Main floor bathrooms deep cleaned
- Cobweb patrol on main floor
- Clock batteries replaced and times set on main floor

We also need your continued, faithful giving to help cover the costs of masks, hand sanitizer, bleach wipes, and tech/music equipment.

We want to pay respects to them all.

A string of lights stretches along the curved sidewalk in front of the cement bench on the corner of New York Avenue and Algoma Boulevard. We invite you to tie a ribbon or ribbons on the display and we ask that you spread the word to your family, neighbors and friends. A bin at the site contains ribbons as well as prayer slips. Helps People In Need Celebrate Theír Líves

Evan Numrich, 13, is leading this month's drive to gather monetary donations and birthday celebration items for the annual Birthday Bags project.

He has grown up as a member of Algoma Boulevard United Methodist Church and is part of a very giving family — dad Herb, mom Jenny and older sisters Ashlynn, 22, and Meghan, 19.

As a student at Shattuck Middle School in Neenah, Evan most enjoys his math class. He also likes music and plays in a band. Pre-COVID, he participated in the musicals put on by the school.

His favorite memories from ABUMC involve learning Bible stories and connecting with them by doing related craft projects. He and his family also are involved in two big giving projects every year — Birthday Bags and Operation Christmas Child — that provide assistance for those in need.

These are done in collaboration with the Ridgeway 4-H Club near Neenah, where Jenny is organizational leader and Evan is treasurer. As a member of the 4-H Club, Evan helps restock shelves at a food pantry and shows exhibits at the Winnebago County Fair. He particularly likes creating objects out of Legos.

For the Birthday Bags project, assembly typically is shared between Sunday School kids at ABUMC and the club. However, the 4-H members will be assembling all Birthday Bags in June. However, the collection of birthday celebration items and monetary donations at ABUMC still is vital. The projects are important, Evan says. "People can't always afford to get what they want. We can help those people who can't give their child a birthday party. It gives them a chance to celebrate their birthday, and it makes their day."

We package birthday bags with cake mix, frosting, candles, a card, paper plates and napkins. We package these bags for the Oshkosh Area Community Pantry for families to get a birthday cake for kids in need. We would like supplies for birthday bags to be donated by April 30. Ridgeway 4-H Club will be packaging them on June 8. For donations, we will take cash and these items: cake mixes, frosting, candles, paper plates and napkins. Also, it costs \$5 to sponsor one bag. We are in most need of cake mixes and frosting. Birthday bag items can be brought into drive-in worship services through April 30 or monetary donations can be mailed to Evan Numrich at 977 S. Prairie Creek Drive, Neenah, WI; or sent through church.

Literacy

Can you spare an hour a week? The Winnebago Area Literacy Council is always looking for individuals willing to be tutors for those in our community wanting to learn English or improve their reading, writing and communication skills. For some of you, tutoring may sound intimidating, but the WALC provides training, guidance and materials to assist tutors. I have been a tutor since 2012, with three different learners, and I have made three new friends! Every learner has different needs and each has different motivation levels. Some are super-motivated to learn and others may be unable to devote a lot of time to their studies, but all are appreciative of the assistance. In addition to one-on-one tutors, right now the WALC has an immediate need for virtual homework help drop-in tutors. This volunteer would have a set time, one hour a week (mid-afternoon or early evening), to be on ZOOM for ELL students attending FVTC English classes. The students could "drop in" as they need help with EL homework. Only English language learners, only English Language students working on English language homework.

Better English skills translates into healthier families and more productive citizens. Consider whether volunteering with the Literacy Council is something God is nudging you to try.

- Sonia Sotomayor, a Supreme Court justice of the United States, and her young friends are planting a garden. Just like the plants that will be growing in their garden, each person is different. Maybe some can't hear very well, or see, or need a wheelchair?

They are probably like some of the children like you or others in your class at school or in your neighborhood. The book is called *Ask Me!* If you are wondering why someone is doing something in an unusual way, Judge Sonia says to ask that person — unless you feel they are too shy to answer. (JFic Sot)

- Are you glad to be back in school with your friends? Two children are glad to see each other. They need to decide which activities they will do. *The Blue Ribbon Day* is by Katie Couric, a TV news reporter. The story tells about the friends' participation in tryout games. Do you think they will be teammates? Are you on the same team as your closest friend? (J Fic Cou)
- Do you remember taking a trip or being invited to an overnight at a friend's or grandparents' home? Did you pack a suitcase? Did you put a surprise in it? The story, *The Suitcase*, is about a very tired strange animal who arrives at a town lugging a BIG suitcase. Some other animals in the town wonder what is in that suitcase. So they ask. You'll be surprised how they found out what was inside. The author is Chris Naylor Ballesteros. Adults:

- Easter is almost here and this next book should have been mentioned in March! Easter Stories: Classic Tales for the Holy Season, compiled by Mirian LeBlanc (08 Leb) is shelved on the SG (Spiritual Growth) shelf in the UMW section. Every season is holy so you can read it anytime! It contains 27 short stories and some poetry chosen "for their spiritual value and literary integrity." They are beautiful stories for both adults and children. Authors include C.S. Lewis, Leo Tolstoy, Oscar Wilde, Elizabeth Goudge, Selma Lagerlof, Anton Chekhov and others. Perfect for family read-aloud.
- Another timely title is What Every Church Member Should Know About Poverty, by Bill Ehlig and Ruby K. Payne (362.5 Ehl). The country and the whole world is dealing with poverty and other social problems related to it. Do we treat people differently who look poor? Visitors usually mention that ABUMC is so friendly and welcoming. But do we know what poverty does to humans? Do they misinterpret our behavior and speech? Are we reaching all the people who may yearn for more connection? This book can teach us about communication and different mindsets. It can be read on its own or as a study book.
