


### **Changes in October Worship**

# October 9th Packers Kick-Off Sunday



The Green Bay Packers play in London on October 9th with an 8:36 a.m. kick-off.

In person worship begins at 8:30 a.m. and goes until kick-off. The game will be shown on the screens in the Sanctuary and in Paine Hall. #### **Loose Change Ministry**



Chances are we don't give much thought to our loose change. But when the coins we toss into the offering plate are combined with those of everyone around us, we

can and do make an impact on the lives of others. Our coin collection during October will benefit Haitian Assets for Peace International. HAPI is a program to transform Haiti through the empowerment and advocacy of women. There is a need to provide long-term and sustainable solutions to poverty alleviation in rural communities in Haiti. Rural communities experience an even greater disparity in economic opportunities, infrastructure, education beyond high school, and health services. They are more impacted by superstition, stigmas, and discrimination. Girls and women bear the brunt of the confluence of these harsh living conditions and societal attitudes. This is evidenced through lower literacy rates, fewer women with higher education, lower economic standing, mortality during childbirth, violence against women and perceptions of women's worth.

HAPI develops initiatives in economic development, supplying knowledge and encouragement for small business owners. They provide health services and improve classrooms, adding technology and IT assistance. Life lessons are taught to encourage respect, equality and hope for a better future.

## The Open Table

The Open Table is the name of our Monday meal program, and it's up and running again this fall. We will be serving the second and fourth Mondays of each month. The second Monday will always be a soup



and sandwich meal, and the fourth Monday will be a planned hot meal.

Open to ALL ages and a great chance to connect with one another.



Cost of the class is \$10 per person – scholarships are available.



## ABUMC 150th Anniversary

Two of the most influential founding members of the Algoma Street ME Church were Robert and Alice McMillen. After only a year of marriage, Robert decided to take his bride, Alice, "way out west" to Wisconsin. They moved from their native New York State in 1854.

Robert started a career in the lumber business with his brother-in-law, Charles Wesley Davis. Together, they bought and sold interest in several companies, becoming two of the wealthiest men in the city.

After a conversion experience with



Maggie Van Cott, both Robert and Alice changed their lives. Robert proclaimed he "became convinced that more was demanded of him than honesty toward his fellow men."

The McMillens are

remembered because of their donation of a large stained-glass window in the present sanctuary. They were principal contributors when the stone edifice was built in 1892. Robert also donated an organ, complete with console, pipes, and installation for the new church.



Alice was a leader in the missionary work of the church. She was a charter member of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society and served as vice

president. She was described as a woman who "nobly bore her share of life's burdens, and cheerfully assisted (her husband) in every good work." She and Robert worked side-by-side to support and nurture the church they loved.

The McMillens regularly invested in the future of their community through gifts to the YMCA, Lawrence University, and other institutions.



Robert died July 23, 1897. His obituaries imply that he was a wonderful man, and they tell us that he was respected and loved by many people.

Alice died at age 84 on Dec. 19, 1916. In a story about her funeral, the *Northwestern* said, "She was highly esteemed by friends and neighbors and always active in unostentatious charities."

The McMillen home, built in 1880, still stands at 1107 Algoma Blvd., on the northwest corner of Algoma Boulevard and Vine Street.
