One of the greatest gifts that we have to offer is the gift of hope. We know that sorrow and joy dance with each other this season, so let's offer hope to all we see. Share with them about *The Heart That Grew Three Sizes* 

Isaiah 9.2-7 is a common scripture lesson for Christmas Eve. It begins, "The people walking in great darkness..." It can feel like we are walking in great darkness as there is s so much doom and gloom around us, but we are people of hope and we know the ongoing story.

For a child has been born for us, a son given to us... he is named Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace... there shall be endless peace...He will establish and uphold it with justice and with righteousness from this time onward...

Love is the story. It's unconditional, unlimited, undeserved LOVE! And it is ours! Jesus came and was anointed "to preach good news to the poor, to proclaim release to the captives and to recover of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed, and to announce that the time had come when you would save your people. # Bishop Jung's Soul Food November 7, 2023



"Making every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace" Ephesians 4:3.

Our world is facing much division, with issues of wars, responses to major natural disasters, polarization of political stances, and an inability to negotiate a middle ground. As Christians, we must focus on the essence of the Gospel so we can live in the way of Christ. We must obey the prayer of Jesus, Who prayed that His followers might become one – as He and the Father were one.

Suppose the Gospel were divided into "left" and "right" ideologies based on the mantras of our culture. With that, the Church would fail with the first step in following Jesus! Rather, let's turn our focus to Jesus, Who called us to do difficult things, like truly honoring differences, living united, and even loving our enemies. Only Jesus can be the savior of the world, so let's obey His often difficult but important teachings that lead to an abundant life.

Theological prejudice fractures the light that confronts the darkness. The power to fight darkness is not separation but Christian unity and perseverance in love. Since we are members of the body of Christ, we must work hard and strive to love and understand one another no matter what. Suppose the church continues to divide, follows the cultural ways, and focuses on a narrow-minded ideology that favors only one side. In that case, it will fracture the light of holiness and leave us with nothing distinct from culture.

Let's take on the way of Jesus! Let's pray to understand each other, seek ways to strengthen relationships - even through tears, and stay together - even though it may be difficult. I believe that the Holy Spirit is like lubricating oil that grinds away the rough parts and makes us into beautiful and generous people. We are being made perfect in God's love and grace.

I believe the secret to living as siblings in Christ is to become people of prayer and perseverance in faith. I pray that our most significant work will be to love the Gospel and to bear witness to it so that our efforts will not be only in defense of the institutional church but the fruit of obedience to Christ Jesus.


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

### GROWING OUR FAITH

Wesleyan Covenant Renewal Service Sunday, December 31, 2023, 10 am



This New Year's Eve Day, we will celebrate one of my favorite worship experiences ~ A Celebration of the Covenant Renewal Service in the Wesleyan Tradition. One of the things that I treasure about this service is the freedom, liberation, and re-commitment it offers for my discipleship journey. I get to practice the art of forgiving myself, letting go, and beginning again.

In the UM Book of Worship, we discover that John Wesley found the service rich and meaningful. There are several journal entries that express his deep appreciation for these worship experiences.

"Many mourned before od, and many were comforted" ~ (April 1756)

"It was, as usual, a time of remarkable blessing" ~ (October 1765)

"It was an occasion for a variety of spiritual experiences...I do not know that ever we had a greater blessing.
Afterward, many desired to return thanks, either for a sense of pardon, for full salvation, or for a fresh manifestation of His graces, healing all their backsliding."

~ (January 1, 1775)

The heart of this service, focused in the Covenant prayer, requires people to commit themselves to God. This covenant is serious and assumes adequate preparation for and continual response to the covenant.

- Let us pray for each as journey toward this commitment.
- Let us examine our discipleship practices ~ what is working to bring us closer to God, and what needs to be changed.
- Let us be open to the power of the Holy Spirit at work within us.



We witness to Jesus Christ in the world and follow his teachings through acts of compassion, justice, worship, and devotion under the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

### **DISCUSSION GUIDE**



### Reclaim.

Bishop Bickerton opens the video by describing a time when he felt unaccepted by peers. Then, at church camp, he found people who valued him, encouraged him and offered him a sense of hope. Surrounded by these people, he had a conversion experience.

- Reflect on your own conversion. Who are the important people in your conversion story?
- How will you reclaim the importance of that moment for you?

#### Read John 4:39-42

In her testimony after her time with Jesus, the woman at the well tells others, "He told me everything I've ever done." Why is that an important part of her story?

### Revive.

Sometimes in life, faith and community, we can lose sight of the things that matter most.

As you reflect on the attributes of beloved community and the advice on unity from the 1850 Book of Discipline (both listed to the right), what similarities do you see?

#### Read Mark 12:28-31

When asked which commandment is the most important, Jesus gives two: Love God. Love people.

- How is the love of God closely connected to the love of others? Why do you think Jesus so closely connects these two loves?
- How might a renewed commitment to love one another (John 13:34-35) encourage unity?

### Renew.

For change to take place, our commitment must be renewed.

- Where are you seeing renewal in the church today? What is your congregation doing that you want to share, to "pass it on?"
- As you reflect on the Bishop's message, where do you feel called to renewal?

#### Read Matthew 5:13-16

Jesus expects his followers to live differently from those around us: to be agents of change by living into God's future now.

What does it mean to be salt & light in your community? In your family? In your congregation?

- 1. A shared desire to be peaceful, happy and safe.
- Recognition that while conflict still exists, it is resolved peacefully, nonviolently and without hostility, ill will or resentment.

- Unconditional and all-inclusive kindness, compassion and love for all life.
- 5. Means used to create change are just as kind and compassionate as the ends we seek.

# 1850 BOOK OF DISCIPLINE ADVICE TO MAINTAIN UNION

#### QUESTION:

What can be done in order to achieve a closer union with each other?

- Let us be deeply convinced of the absolute necessity of it.
- 2. Pray earnestly for and speak freely to each other.
- 3. When we meet, let us never depart without prayer.
- Take great care not to despise each other's gifts.
- 5. Never speak lightly of each other.
- Let us defend each other's character in everything so far as is consistent with the truth.
- 7. Labor in honor each to prefer the other before himself.
- We recommend a serious perusal of the book, "The Causes, Evils, and Cures of Heart and Church Division" [written by Francis Asbury].

### Sunday Discussion Group Finish up "First Light" on December 3<sup>rd</sup>. Starting in January "A Force More Powerful"

We will not be meeting any of the December Sundays when that interferes with any special church services.

This six-week study explores six successful nonviolent movements in the 20th century, including Mohandas Gandhi's leadership of the Indian Independence movement, the Civil Right Movement, the boycotts of the Eastern Cape Province as part of the Anti-Apartheid movement in South Africa, the Danish resistance in the Nazi Occupation, the Polish Solidarity Movement, and the Chilean democracy movement to oust Augusto Pinochet. Some of us remember some of the news reports of these activities, but we probably never fully understood how important nonviolence was in reaching the final conclusion in each of the situations.

The study will include the possibility of reading the complete book about the activities or reading summaries of the materials, and a DVD based on a PBS program on the subject.

Each cabin is heated and equipped with bathrooms, showers, and a fireplace. There are two single beds per room. There are also fireplaces in Ridgewood Lodge, where we meet for many of our activities, and in the Milton Geise Building, where our five meals are served family-style. 

Dr. O'Connell walked the streets at night, offering medical care, food, and friendship.

### **United Women in Faith Updates** By Sandy Butcher, President

On Oct.13 and 14<sup>h</sup>, 2023, the Wisconsin Conference of the United Women in Faith held their Annual Celebration at Lake Street United Methodist Church in Eau Claire. It was a wonderful event filled with worship events, music, fellowship, and information!

The weekend began with an opportunity for service followed by fellowship with a delicious meal, a visit to the Chippewa Valley Museum, and then a tour of the sculptures in Eau Claire. The walking sculpture tour provided an opportunity to raise money for the UWF "Move 4 Mission" program started by Wisconsin's own Heidi Carteaga. We gathered for worship and to learn from some great speakers on Friday and Saturday: "Soul Care" by Sarah Aiken-Felling; "How to Have Difficult Conversations" by Kerri Parker; and keynote speaker, Mike Cohoon, who shared the Hope Village Chippewa Falls program for short-term and longer-term housing alternatives and services for people experiencing homelessness in Chippewa County.

Saturday's breakout sessions offered more opportunities for learning. First was the "Ministries of Chippewa Valley," second was the "Kairos Prison Ministry," third was "Our Whole Lives Faith and Sexuality over the Lifetime," fourth was "Why Gardening is Good for Us," and fifth was "Shaping Destiny."

Trying to put into words the experience of this weekend is difficult. But I will close with the fact that there are so many amazing women throughout the state who put their faith, hope, and love into action. I am proud to represent ABUMC United Women in Faith and the women of our unit as we stand together for women, children, and youths around the world.
