


one time or another have lost our vibrancy or at least had our light dim for awhile.

Jan. 23, 2024

Glenview, Ill.—It's official: Wisconsin Conference and Northern Illinois Conference will start sharing a bishop on September 1, 2024.

The North Central Jurisdiction (NCJ), meeting online in a special session on Jan. 23, passed two motions: to form a new episcopal area composed of Northern Illinois and Wisconsin Conferences and to form another composed of East Ohio and West Ohio Conferences.

"The vote by members of the Jurisdictional Conference means the rapport we have already developed with our comparable colleagues in Wisconsin will propel our ongoing work and that of responsible annual conference committees in making decisions to have things in place for Sept. 1," said Rev. Myron McCoy, pastor of First United Methodist Church at the Chicago Temple and chair of the Northern Illinois Shared Bishop Task Force.

"The action by the NCJ to consolidate four Episcopal Areas into two clarifies the future direction of one bishop serving both the Wisconsin and Northern Illinois conferences,"

stated Rev. Steve Zekoff, chair of Wisconsin's Shared Ministry Task Force. "The question is no longer will we share a bishop. The focus can now be on **how** we can maximize effective episcopal oversight of our two separate annual conferences. There is much to be gained as we live into being yoked as parts of a single Episcopal Area. We will continue to have our unique individual conference identities, yet under the leadership of a shared bishop opportunities for future cooperation will become more evident over time. Both conferences have strengths that can benefit the other."

As two annual conferences in one episcopal area, Northern Illinois and Wisconsin will continue to govern themselves separately and retain their staff. However, the same bishop will oversee both conferences.

Methodists in Wisconsin, Northern Illinois, and Iowa were once in the same annual conference, Rock River, established in 1840. The establishment of The United Methodist Church in 1968 formed the Wisconsin Conference and Northern Illinois Conference from the new denomination's predecessor bodies.

WHAT'S UP IN WORSHIP

The *Season after the Epiphany* is coming to a close. We will celebrate communion one more time in this season of light and celebrate the transfiguration of Christ before heading into the *Lenten season*.

As we gather for communion, we will reflect upon God's presence in the world and in our lives. How much we really pay attention to? Do we really believe in the God that takes on the care of the world, be the same God who desires to know us intimately? How do we experience God?

Pastor Keith will lead us in an exploration of the transfiguration of Christ—where Jesus' form completely changed and Peter, James, and John witness the glory of his divinity first hand.

Soul Reset: breakdown, breakthrough, and the journey to wholeness


Our 2024 Lenten series is based on the book *Soul Reset* by Rev. Junius Dotson. He was a recognized visionary leader in church revitalization and served as the General Secretary (chief executive officer) of Discipleship Ministries of The United Methodist Church. He began his tenure on July 1, 2016, and served until his death at age 55 on February 25, 2021. He was an amazing disciple and leader who learned in his zeal to serve God and others, that he also needed to take care of himself. He realized that he needed a *Soul Reset*—a hard stop to chronic busyness, a deep look inward, an intentional reliance on spiritual practices to help him reconnect with God, and a new path toward the abundant life into which Jesus calls us.

Rev. Dotson wrote, "Vulnerability and authenticity are the only way to find wholeness in Jesus Christ. Jesus invites us to be real, with him and with one another."

Until churches create safe space where people can honestly tell their stories, we will continue to hear about depression, burnout, stress, anxiety, and shame. Rev. Dotson also shared, "Everything was fine—until it wasn't."

For the past three years, we lived in the unprecedented time of the global COVID-19 pandemic. We all carry another marker in our lives—the before and after the pandemic. It was an exhausting three years that we had to learn anew how to live and work with each other in some challenging and oppressive circumstances. We offer this series for everyone who may be in need of a "reset."





Slow down and allow God to transform your life.



They are people and leaders whose lives are tangible demonstrations of the power of a divine purpose and evidence of what grace really means in the face of hardship, disappointment, and determination."

United Women in Faith supports almost 90 National Mission Institutions. National Mission Institutions are community-based organizations and social service agencies that were almost exclusively founded by women in the 19th century to serve marginalized communities and populations across the United States.

The only NMI in the state of Wisconsin is the Northcott Neighborhood House which began 63 years ago in Milwaukee. The Northcott Neighborhood House Juneteenth festivities have been occurring for 51 years, one of the longest and largest in the country. Northcott Neighborhood House programs connect and empower the community through service; their training and employment services cover GED programs, apprenticeship programs and transitional jobs; and their construction program has rehabbed and/or constructed more than 800 homes in the last 15 years. SNOW MUCH FUN!





SHROVE TUESDAY FEBRUARY 13TH!

Shrove Tuesday, also known in various cultures as Mardi Gras, Fat Tuesday, Pancake Tuesday or Pancake Day, is observed the day before Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent, set for February 14 this year.

Shrove Tuesday is observed by many Christians, including Methodists, Anglicans, Lutherans, and Roman Catholics, who "make a special point of self-examination, of considering what wrongs they need to repent, and what amendments of life or areas of spiritual growth they especially need to ask God's help in dealing with." It is determined by the date of Easter.

The tradition of marking the start of Lent has been documented for centuries, at least since the year 1000 AD. The expression "Shrove Tuesday" comes from the word shrive, meaning "absolve," and observances often include confession and absolution, the ritual burning of the previous year's Holy Week palms for use in Ash Wednesday services the next day, and finalizing one's Lenten sacrifice.

As this is the last day before the penitential season of Lent, it is a chance for a last round of merriment and is celebrated popularly by carnivals and indulging in sweets and rich, fatty foods that might be given up as part of their Lenten sacrifices for the upcoming 40 days. It was traditional in many societies to eat pancakes or other foods made with the butter, eggs and fat or lard that would need to be used up before the beginning of Lent.





ONE MORE DAY....

2024 is Leap Year which means we will have February 29th this year. While we follow the 365-day Gregorian calendar, it takes the Earth 365 days, 5 hours, 48 minutes and 46 seconds, or 365.2422 days, to orbit around the sun.

Those extra hours add up to an extra day approximately every four years. Without the extra day in leap years, calendars and seasons would gradually fall out of sync. That, in turn, impacts planting and harvesting.

Fun Leap Year facts:

- Because of its rarity, many cultures consider Leap Year one of great good luck. It is thought to help us make a giant leap forward toward our soul's mission and purpose and our life goals and dreams.
- Five million people around the world have leap year birthdays. On non-leap years, they usually celebrate on either February 28 or March 1.
- Unhappy consequences: if you're a prisoner on a one-year sentence that spans a Leap Day; or if you work on a fixed annual salary: no extra pay for that extra day.
- Depending on who you ask. The odds of being born on February 29th are 1 in 1,461, or .068 per cent. Being born on Leap Day is actually rarer than being born with 11 fingers and toes (odds are 1 in 500). Surely beating out those tiny odds has got to be a little bit lucky!
- According to an old Irish legend, St. Brigid struck a deal with St Patrick to allow women to propose to men every four years. After the Gregorian calendar and Leap Year was instituted in 1582, it came up again, and by 1700s, British women were using Leap Day to propose to the men in their lives.
 - The tradition now called Bachelor's Day or Sadie Hawkins Day peaked in popularity in the early 1900s and continues today in the UK, where some retailers even offer discount packages to women popping the question.
- The unmarried Queen Margaret ordered to impose a fine for men who would deny a woman her dream marriage. The European tradition dictates that any man who refuses a woman's proposal on February 29th must buy her 12 pairs of gloves. The intention is that the woman can wear the gloves to hide the embarrassment of not having an engagement ring. During the Middle Ages there were *laws* governing this 'tradition'.
- Leap Day Cocktail was invented at London's Savoy Hotel in 1928. According to the 1930 Savoy Cocktail Book, "It is said to have been responsible for more proposals than any other cocktail ever mixed."



According to reporter Rick Barrett of the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel, about 360 dairy farms went out of business in Wisconsin in 2020, a trend that has accelerated in the last decade. Clark County sits in the middle of the state and at the epicenter of the crisis. Cows outnumber people, and there are more dairy farms than in any other county in the state. Hundreds of millions of dollars flow into the local economy from those farms.

In conversations, farmers and family members talked about the conflicting emotions that come from having deep, personal connections to a precarious business and the pressures to preserve a way of life.

Harvest of Hope, Madison, was launched in January 1986 to provide financial help and hope to Wisconsin Farm Families in difficult financial situations. It was started in the midst of the farm crisis of the 1980s, but the farm crisis never really ended, so the fund continues to offer financial help and hope to struggling farm families. Over the 34 years, Harvest of Hope has sent over 1700 gifts totaling more than \$1,148,000! Every dollar contributed to Harvest of Hope goes directly to farm families since all administrative costs are covered.

Coins contributed during the offering in the month of February will go to Harvest of Hope.


