





> could hear the whispered word of God more clearly?

A Lenten Journey Greeting by Bishop Hee-Soo Jung February 2024

As a conference, this Lenten Season, we will engage in a book study, Dynamite Prayer: A 28-Day Experiment by Rosario Picardo and Sue Nilson Kibbey. This study is designed to help participants meditate on Scripture, reflect on questions for the day, write a short breakthrough prayer, and utilize these prayers as part of their daily activity.

Our dynamite prayer initiative will give one more additional missional reason for us to be of one mind after disaffiliation and separation. Prayer will allow us to go deep in unity and solidarity.

As part of our encouragement, the full cabinet and three support staff have written a breakthrough prayer that will be posted on Facebook and on the conference website, Monday through Friday, to connect each of us – one to another. It is a marvelous opportunity to be intentional, thoughtful, and courageous in our prayer life.

As we begin this Lenten Study, I hope that this will be a catalyst for renewal in our church and in our personal dedication to Jesus Christ. Wednesday, February 14, 2024, is Ash Wednesday and marks the beginning of our prayerful journey. I offer this poem about prayer.

O God, our love, be again Center-Act for us.



March Coins

Haiti Alive

During the month of March, your offering coins will benefit Haiti Alive. Haiti Alive is a nonprofit organized to serve God and to bring hope, health, and happiness to the people on the island of La Gonave, Haiti. The message of Christ is conveyed through education, healthcare, and ministering to those in need, especially women, children, and the elderly.

Craig Blumer's brother, Bruce, was a co-founder of Haiti Alive. Bruce went to La Gonave, Haiti, on a church medical mission in 2008 and again in 2010. He was there during the devastating 2010 Haiti earthquake. The island was not as impacted as Port-au-Prince, where the effect was tremendous, but it had a huge effect on Bruce. He returned on his own a year later to ask people what they needed. What he heard has become the focus of Haiti Alive — Education, Healthcare, and Women & Children. This effort started as a mission of their church and then grew into its own nonprofit organization. Check out Bruce's blog here.

The goal of the Haiti Alive Village is to provide a hand-up for women by constructing simple homes, allowing women and their families to move away from difficult living settings, and providing women equity by owning a home and property.

There is a shortage of medical care across the island of La Gonave. The medicine and care provided through Haiti Alive's clinics are truly life-giving and life-saving. Mobile clinics travel to small villages to provide care for those who have no access to medical care or are unable to travel.

A school for grades 1-9 is provided, including a computer lab, language lab, a daily meal, a nurse on staff, a bus to pick up the children, and security 24 hours a day.

Throughout the month of January, we collected non-perishable food and personal care items for the Oshkosh Area Community Pantry. In all, we **raised \$374 dollars and donated 280 items** to the pantry. Thank you for caring for the vulnerable families of Oshkosh.

On Jan. 24, 2024, Kay Kuenzl-Stenerson of the Teacher's Closet spoke during our unit meeting. Kay presented a very informative talk about the history of the Teacher's Closet, the items that they provide to the teachers in our area, and the new location that they recently acquired.

Supplies were collected and given to Kay. A monetary collection from our members was also donated, along with a speaker's fee. Every year, our unit gives a monetary donation for this important community resource, and it was good to learn more about this valuable service for our local teachers.  Our next unit meeting will be held at 1 p.m. March 20. This meeting will be our kick-off for collecting items for the Midwest Mission Distribution Center during the Annual Conference. Churches are asked to donate items for people in need or suffering from disasters. This year, the unit has decided to collect items for Personal Dignity Kits or Bed Pack Kits until our May 15 meeting. All items and monetary donations will be given to Pastor Ellen to take to the Annual Conference in June.

On Saturday, April 13, the Wisconsin United Women in Faith will host Social Action Day via Zoom. The theme is "Ending Mass **Incarceration and Improving** Treatment of Incarceration Impacted Women." Honorable/Rev. Everett Mitchell will be the keynote speaker. Mitchell is a Dane County circuit court judge and senior pastor of Christ the Solid Rock Baptist Church. He is a fierce advocate for education, social justice, and equity. Peggy West-Schroder also will speak. She is the executive director for FREE, a project led by criminal-legal system-impacted women in Wisconsin. FREE focuses on the gender-specific experiences and collateral consequences of women and girls interacting with the criminal legal system.

Peggy works to ensure that incarcerated women across Wisconsin are treated with dignity, feel supported, and are provided trauma-informed care.

We will gather at church at 9 a.m. to watch the Zoom sessions. Please look for additional registration information about this important event.
