Dear Beloved ~

I find November to be a powerful month in the Christian year. In the *Earn. Save. Give.* stewardship series, we were reminded by John Wesley "to begin with the end in mind." For me, the end that I have in mind is pure love—I confess that I do not have a full vision of what that is or could be, but I trust that God does. As a believer in God's immeasurable love and grace, I trust that wherever I go, I am responding to God's call and God is with me.

November reminds me that I begin with the end in mind.

We begin the month with an All Saints Day celebration. The scripture from Revelation (above) is often used as we remember the saints that have brought us to this point in our lives. They are part of the foundation on which we live and move and have our being. We have been prayed into existence by the saints who have come before us. We are praying the next generations of disciples of Jesus Christ into existence with our prayers. We are holders of the precious stories for just a little while and have a responsibility to pass the stories on.

The same passage could apply to the last Sunday of November when we celebrate Reign of Christ/Christ the King Sunday. This Sunday's celebration marks the completion of creation and the coming

reign of Christ. I like to imagine that we are free to be fully and complete as God intended us to be and that LOVE reigns. Once again, I cannot fully define what that looks like, but I believe that we are bearers of the light of Christ.

But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control.

Our journey here is a preparation for the life to come. We bear witness to that belief every time we pray the prayer that Jesus taught:

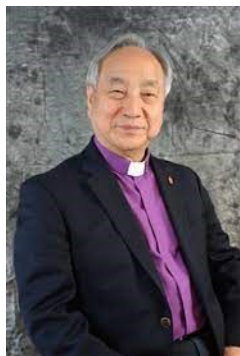
...on earth as in heaven.

## Growing Our Faith ~ Adult Opportunities

### **“First Light: Jesus and the Kingdom of God” Adult Discussion Group**

Why were the titles of Caesar Augustus — Divine, Song of God, God from God, Lord, Redeemer, Liberator, and Savior of the World — taken from a Roman emperor on the Palatine hill and given to a Jewish peasant on the Palestine plain? Was it a low lampoon or high treason?

Either way, the Romans were not laughing. What were the priorities of Jesus' proclamation of the Kingdom? How was the status quo of Roman Imperial theology subverted by the obscure Galilean whose message continues to indict empire today?

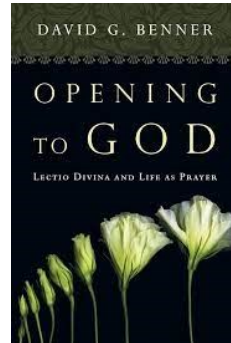
First Light is a 12-session study (with hand-out reading materials and a video presentation) of the historical Jesus and the Kingdom of God with two of the world's leading Jesus scholars on location throughout Galilee and Jerusalem. The reading materials were written by Dominic Crossan who says, "It is all I have to say about Jesus after half a century of study in succinct summary."

The study is held at 10:30 a.m. on Sundays in the Fireside Room. On days the choir sings, the study will begin after the choir members can get to the Fireside Room.

Attendance is limited to 12 participants to encourage good discussion. Please sign up for the discussion group on the lobby table or with Don Nelson, discussion leader, and obtain the reading materials for the first lesson.

### **“Opening to God: Lectio Divina and Life as Prayer”**

Book discussion group continuing



Prayer is not merely something we do; prayer is what God does in us. Prayer is not just communication with God; it is communion with God. As we open ourselves to God, God does the spiritual work of transformation in us. All of life can be prayer when offered to God in faith and with openness.

Using the four movements of lectio divina, spiritual director David Benner explores prayer as attending, pondering, responding and being. Along the way, he opens us to a world of possibilities for communion with God: praying with our senses, with imagination, with music and creativity, in contemplation, in service and much more.

Learn how prayer can be a way of living your life. Move beyond words to become not merely someone who prays, but someone whose entire life is prayer in union with God.

The group is meeting at 6:30 p.m. Tuesdays through Nov. 28 in the Fireside Room. The discussion is led by retired pastor Keith Wolf.

## All Saints Day

Celebrating Those Who Have  
Passed Before Us

All Saints' Day — also known as All Hallows' Day, the Feast of All Saints, the Feast of All Hallows, the Solemnity of All Saints, and Halloween — is celebrated in Western Christianity on Nov. 1 by many Protestant churches, such as the Methodist, Lutheran and Anglican traditions, and the Roman Catholic Church. The night before All Saints' Day is known as All Hallows' Eve or Halloween (Hallow is the German word for the Latin sanctus).

In the United Methodist Church, All Saints' Day is celebrated not only to remember all the saints but all Christians, living and deceased, particularly members of the local church congregation who have died during the past year.

This Christian celebration stems from a belief that there is a powerful spiritual bond between those in heaven, the living, and the faithful departed.

In Methodist theology, All Saints Day revolves around "giving God solemn thanks for the lives and deaths of his saints," including those who are "famous or obscure." From



the 4th century, a feast day to commemorate all Christian martyrs was held in various places and at various times. By 800, there is evidence that churches in Ireland, Northumbria (England and Scotland), and Bavaria (Germany) held a feast commemorating all saints on November 1, possibly to coincide with a Celtic festival of the dead.

By the 9th century, this date was confirmed by Pope Gregory IV for the entire Frankish Empire, which then developed into the Holy Roman Empire.

## OBSERVING ALL SAINTS DAY

### AROUND THE WORLD

**Austria and Bavaria:** Godparents give their godchildren *Allerheiligenstriezel*, a braided yeast pastry.

**Belgium:** *Tousaint* or *Allerheiligen* is a public holiday. Belgians visit the cemeteries to place chrysanthemums on the graves of deceased relatives.

**France:** It is a public holiday, and flowers — especially chrysanthemums or wreaths — are placed at each tomb or grave.

**Germany:** *Allerheiligen* is a public holiday in five federal states and is categorized as a silent day (*stiller Tag*) when public entertainment events are only permitted if the serious character of the day is preserved.

**Hungary:** On this national holiday, people take candles and flowers (especially chrysanthemums) to the tombs or graves of all their loved ones and relatives thus many people travel around the country to distant cemeteries. People who cannot travel may lay their flowers or candles at the main Calvary cross of a nearby cemetery.

**Poland:** On this public holiday and bank holiday, families gather to tend to family graves and the surrounding graveyards, lighting candles and leaving flowers.

**Portugal:** *Dia de Todos os Santos* is a national holiday. Families remember their dead with religious observances and visits to the cemetery. Portuguese children go door-to-door, where they receive cakes, nuts, pomegranates, sweets and candies.

**Spain:** *Día de Todos los Santos* is a national holiday. People from all over the country return to their town or village to lay flowers on the graves of deceased relatives. The play “Don Juan Tenorio” is traditionally performed.

**Guatemala:** All Saints' Day is a national holiday. Guatemalans make a special meal called *fiambre* made of cold meats and vegetables; it is customary to visit cemeteries and to leave *fiambre* for their dead. It is also customary to fly kites to help unite the dead with the living.

**Mexico:** All Saints' Day coincides with the first day of the Day of the Dead (*Día de Muertos*) celebration, commemorating first children who have died, and the second day all deceased adults.

**Philippines:** Filipinos visit their families' graves to clean and repair the tombs, prayers for the dead are recited, while offerings are made, the most common being flowers, candles, food. Many also spend the day and ensuing night holding reunions at the graves with feasting and merriment.

## **United Methodist Student Day Sunday November 26**

United Methodist Student Day was the original Special Sunday founded by United Methodist Church Sunday Schools who collected offerings to help advance education for their children. The fund originally was established in 1872 as the Children's Fund. Today, United Methodist Student Day Sunday has the same purpose, calling upon the denomination to support their students as they prepare for life by adding knowledge to their faith.

Every year, General Board of Higher Education and Ministry awards an average of \$5.5 million in financial aid to United Methodist students. The offering taken on United Methodist Student Day is one opportunity to support these scholarships. Every dollar received goes toward supporting and educating a new generation of principled Christian leaders for the church and the world.

## **November Offering Coins**

We support Prison Fellowship every year with our Angel Tree program, providing gifts to children of incarcerated parents in our area. This Christian organization also began a program in 2016 called Prison Fellowship Academy.

Located in select prisons across the country, the [Prison Fellowship Academy](http://prisonfellowship.org) (prisonfellowship.org) takes men and women through a holistic life transformation. They are guided by Prison Fellowship staff and volunteers to lead lives of purpose and productivity inside and outside of prison. Prison Fellowship Academy uses targeted curriculum, compassionate coaches, and restorative community to replace participants' criminal thinking and behaviors with renewed purpose and biblically based life principles.

Graduates complete the yearlong program as change agents and good citizens inside and outside of prison. There are now 101 academies across the United States.

## Report from the Trustees

The Trustees have been very active in 2023 with normal day-to-day operations of the church as well as Phase I of the Capital Campaign Projects.

## Capital Campaign Projects

\* City of Oshkosh bill for Algoma Boulevard road and sidewalks was paid in full in October.

\* Two boilers in the basement were replaced: one for Paine Hall and the other for the sanctuary. Gartman has been working on this project since August and completed it in late October. There are new piping and valves, two new boilers and a water softener unit; and asbestos had to be removed.

\* New security system with Per Mar, including new locks in the door and key fob entry.

\* Lightbulbs in the sanctuary were replaced for temporary improvement of lighting. Full replacement of light fixtures is still on the list for Phase II or Phase III.

## Projects

\* Cut down two trees by the driveway and Read School. Two more may have to be cut down in the spring of 2024.

\* Replaced cracked window on main entrance.

\* New hot water heater for the school area.

\* (6) new round tables with cart added to increase the number of tables we have for events. Also replaced legs on some tables.

\* Upon fire inspection, upgraded lighting in the basement and replaced exit signs throughout the church to be code-based.

\* New AC unit for Paine Hall installed.

Other projects remain for the end of 2023, and the Trustees will start 2024 with discussion of Phase II projects under the Capital Campaign. — Steve Zehner
