Here are some types of planned giving:

Wills and Bequests

Have you included the church in your will or considered the ways to give in addition to cash?

Stocks, Bonds and Mutual Funds

A gift of securities, including stocks or mutual funds, is an easy way for you to make a gift.

Retirement Assets

Retirement assets, such as a gift from your IRA, 401k, 403b, pension or other tax-deferred plan make excellent gifts.

Real Estate

If you own appreciated real estate, you can avoid paying capital gains tax by making a gift to the Foundation for the benefit of your church, favorite ministries or charities.

Life Insurance

A life insurance policy is an excellent gift, especially if your policy is no longer needed or will no longer benefit your survivors.

Donor Advised Fund

You can make a gift now and receive your charitable tax deduction immediately. Then take your time in distributing your gift proceeds to the qualified charities of your choice.

Life Income Gifts

A Life Income Gift is an arrangement that provides you or others with income and leaves a gift for charity in the future. These gifts also may entitle you to a tax savings.

Charitable Gift Annuity

You transfer cash or appreciated property to the Foundation in exchange for a fixed income annuity payment (with rates based on your age) for the rest of your life.

Charitable Remainder Unitrust

You transfer cash or appreciated property to fund a charitable trust. The trust sells your property tax free and provides you with variable income payments for life or a term of years.

Back-to-School Fair

It doesn't seem right to be thinking about getting back to school already, but in order for kids to be ready when that first day of school arrives, we need to consider their needs. The United Way Community Back to School Fair assists more than 1,000 lower-income families in our school system in getting their kids off to a good start with school and hygiene supplies. We've been asked to help with providing clothing items. Check out the slips hanging in the missions area at church. The tags indicate the gender and age of a student and what items of clothing they need. It is possible to also buy a department store gift card for them to use to choose their own outfit. Take a tag, purchase the gift, and return to the mission shelves by Aug. 1.

Zoe Empowers July Coins

Can you imagine only eating three times per week, never accessing a doctor, being unable to read this, sleeping on a tree branch? 380 million children live this life.

Zoe Empowers began as a relief organization, Zimbabwe Orphan Endeavor, to address the huge numbers of children orphaned by the 2004 AIDS/HIV pandemic in Africa. In 2007, they were introduced to Rwandan social workers who were using an unconventional technique. Instead of giving away resources, they were teaching orphans how to care for themselves and their siblings.

Within a year, Zoe embraced this empowerment model. Guided by the core belief of not doing anything for these young people that they can be taught to do for themselves, Zoe Empowers equips orphaned and vulnerable children to overcome extreme poverty by addressing multiple barriers simultaneously. Children receive a small grant and training. Children who once lived in poverty become entrepreneurs, providers and leaders in their communities.

The coins we place in the offering basket in July will help orphaned children in Kenya, Rwanda, Zimbabwe, Malawi, Liberia, India and Tanzania to live self-sufficient healthy lives.

Stained-glass Window Recalls Story of Remarkable Female Preacher

As we continue to remember the history of our congregation in this building, you might be curious about our beautiful stained-glass windows. Maggie Van Cott is featured on one of these windows. This is amazing and confusing because she was born in New York on March 25, 1830, and she never lived in Oshkosh, Wisconsin. Here is a small part of her story:

Margaret Newton Van Cott had been preaching and saving souls wherever churches called upon her. She had been preaching from the Bible for two years when she finally was given a license to preach on March 6, 1869. She was the first woman to be granted a license to preach in the Methodist Episcopal Church.

She had memorized Bible passages and she preached without consulting her script. She would convey whatever illustrations were needed to help each audience find a way to Christ. In addition, she had a beautiful singing voice and would break into song at any moment as the Spirit moved her.

She was well-known in Oshkosh because she had preached at First Methodist Episcopal Church more than once and had brought large numbers of people to Christ.

An 1872 revival was held over several days, in a tent in McMillen's Woods, which was owned by Robert and Alice McMillen. The property was the area south of Oshkosh Avenue between Eagle and Westfield streets where Davis Child Care Center and Evergreen Retirement Community now stand.


Many of our charter members would have heard her preach and taken more seriously their role as followers of Christ. Their success during the early years of Algoma Boulevard United Methodist Church is in large part due to the influence of Maggie Newton Van Cott. By the time she retired in 1902, she had converted more than 75,000 people, half of whom joined the Methodist Episcopal Church.



YOUTH MISSION TRIP - SUMMER 2022

Both of our camps were hit hard by the storms on June 15th. Tornados and high winds tore through forests and communities,

uprooting trees and taking down hundreds of power lines.

At Lake Lucerne and Pine Lake, whole stands of trees were torn or toppled, electricity was out and the rains came hard and heavy. Even in the storms, God was present and visible in the spirits of the campers and staff and helpers.

All the campers and leaders sheltered safely. Even with no electricity, they turned on their flashlights, sang, worshiped together, told stories, and supported each other. They emerged from their safe shelter to witness the astounding devastation of trees blocking their way and branches everywhere. And yet, God's presence was experienced through the night.

By midday Thursday, electricity was back on at Pine Lake. Lake Lucerne didn't get electricity back until Friday and Saturday, so they made the difficult decision to send campers home early - food couldn't be kept safe and the septic and water systems weren't functioning. Throughout, God's presence was experienced in the good will of campers and all the helpers.

Since the storm, volunteers have been showing up with chain saws and willingness to haul brush and help clear the roads and trails, including ABUMC's Zehner family.

Through the United Committee on Relief (UMCOR), the camps have received a \$10,000 solidarity grant to defray expenses not covered by insurance.

Foresters are assessing the trees to guide recovery and removal. Service workers are assuring the safety of the electricity and repairing the Lucerne dishwasher which was damaged by an electrical surge – staff are hand washing dishes for the 70 campers that arrived on Sunday.

Each camp has hundreds of trees down. Cleaning up after this storm will take a long time. What a gift to have willing and capable workers already offering help! God is present through all the volunteers and service workers arriving.

New campers have arrived at both sites, eager to experience all that camp has to offer. The summer staff, while exhausted by all the extra work, are energetic and caring for the new campers. (Our own Kellyn, joins the Lucerne staff this week! Pray for her!)

While directors, Tanner and Nick are still busy with cleaning, clearing, and restoring the camps, they are also working with staff to welcome the next groups of campers all summer and assure that they have a wonderful experience at camp.

God is present through it all! If you want to help, financial donations are welcome through the camp websites. If you want to help in other ways, Pastor Cathy can connect you with our coordinator or the Wisconsin UM Volunteers in Mission who are gathering work crews.
